As one of the UK's most groundbreaking visual artists, Woolcock's career spanning film, opera and television is widely celebrated for her intimate and uncompromising portrayals of social inequality in cities. As a former resident of Oxford, Woolcock is familiar with both the fictional portrayals and the lived reality of the city. Her exhibition *Fantastic Cities* reflects on differing accounts from a number of cities and works to translate people's real experiences into film.

Our public programme delves deeper into the themes of Woolcock's expansive works including a talk about using art as a political tool and a fascinating exploration of the research that is running alongside the creation of Woolcock's new work *When the Same Road is a Different Road*. There will also be a series of workshops suitable for all ages available in our dedicated learning space, Moving Image.

Penny Woolcock: Fantastic Cities

17 November 2018 - 3 March 2019

Fantastic Cities is the first major solo exhibition by award-winning artist and director Penny Woolcock (b.1950, Buenos Aires, lives in London). Woolcock is widely celebrated for her intimate portrayals of people experiencing systemic inequalities in society. Her pioneering work, both compassionate and challenging, spans street-cast fiction film, documentary, opera and major arts projects.

Centred on personal stories, and created in close collaboration with her subjects, her exceptional narratives offer powerful, honest and often humorous insight into the complex reality of life on the margins. The exhibition focuses on the contrasts and similarities of lived experiences in contemporary cities and includes a number of newly commissioned works.

When the Same Road is a Different Road (2018) is a dynamic new film installation presenting the startlingly different responses of two individual narratives, one the artist and the other a young gang member, on a short walk through the same city streets. When I First Saw A Gun (2018) portrays honest reflections on personal gun use from a range of diverse people. Fantastic Cities (2018) is a sound and film installation interrogating perceptions of Oxford and Los Angeles, two cities famously represented by fictitious narratives created through film and literature. Fantastic Cities explores the idea that, for many, the lived experience of these cities may at times be more unexpected than fiction.

PROJECT SPACE

Moving Image

17 November 2018 – 3 March 2019 Free entry, all welcome

Moving Image invites visitors of all ages to respond creatively to the work of Penny Woolcock.

Inspired by Woolcock's wide-ranging practice in film, television, art and opera, Modern Art Oxford have constructed a unique small film set that allows you to edit your own personal experiences using archive images from Oxfordshire History Centre. Visitors can construct, adapt and recreate familiar Oxford scenes to share narratives that convey different aspects of the city.

Working collaboratively with Oxfordshire Printmakers Co-operative (co-founded by Penny Woolcock in 1977), a series of bookable workshops are available to develop and share skills using different print processes such as linocut, etching and monoprinting.

Artist Film Programme: Penny Woolcock

1-16 November 2018

Penny Woolcock has selected four films that have informed and influenced her practice to be shown in the run up to *Fantastic Cities*.

Francis Alys, The Nightwatch, 2004

This film documents Alÿs' release of an urban fox into London's National Portrait Gallery in the middle of the night. It uses the museum's CCTV system to follow its movements and, for Woolcock, represents a creature from one part of the city entering the environment of another.

Penny Woolcock, Road Movie, 2015

This fascinating short love story between two plastic bags documents the artist's interest in the objects and people we discard as a society. She suggests that the things we ignore and consider worthless can be very beautiful when looked at properly.

Maya Brandt, Funny Valentine, 1979

Seen for the first time by Woolcock in 1979 at what was then called the Museum of Modern Art Oxford, this short film is a cautionary tale of love and marriage told using plasticine figures.

Alexander Fry, Yes, Sure, 2018

Screened for the first time, this film by Woolcock's long-term collaborator is an exploration of personal memory, class and changing physical landscapes.

Art at Westgate : Art Tour and Artists' Panel Discussion Friday 2 November Curator-led walking tour, 3-4pm Panel Discussion, 4.30-5.45pm

This tour and talk celebrate Art at Westgate, a programme of public art featuring work by some of the most respected artists working today: David Batchelor, Daniela Schönbächler, Rana Begum, Nicky Hirst and William Cobbing. This special event brings all five artists together in a discussion chaired by Modern Art Oxford Director Paul Hobson. It is preceded by a curator-led tour of artworks commissioned for locations throughout Westgate.

Art as Culture War with John R. Blakinger Thursday 31 January, 6.30–8pm

Over the past few years, dramatic controversies have become a defining feature of contemporary art. Why has the pristine space of the museum become a battlefield? This lecture relates the recent collision of art and politics to past culture wars and a deeper history of political conflict in the gallery. John R. Blakinger is a Terra Foundation Visiting Professor of American Art at the University of Oxford.

Hip hop artist Zimbo Freemind and friends, discuss the influence of arts and culture on their lives and share accounts of the long-term impact of participating in Woolcock's awardwinning film One Mile Away (2012).





Lebanon). Zaatari is co-founder of the Arab Image Foundation and his work focusses on collecting, studying and archiving the photographic history of the Arab World.


Claudette Johnson 1 June – 1 September 2019
